Called by God to help the mission

How can you see suffering and poverty, and not want to help? 99

For Steve and Karen Jones, the answer to Elder Jones' question is simple: they are called by God to help. Even if that call means living away from their home and family for

The couple, who are members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints and live near Salt Lake City, Utah, are among 30 senior missionaries in Kansas. They are serving the hungry at Our Daily Bread Food Pantry and teach English classes, including two classes for refugees served by International Rescue Committee (ICR).

"We all love it. The Lord knows where we need to go," says Elder Jones. "We spend about two-thirds of our time in service to the community, and about one-third of our time in service to the church."

When looking for ways to serve the Wichita community, they searched the web for opportunities and discovered Our Daily Bread Food Pantry at Catholic Charities.

"It sounded like fun and a good way to help. We like the way Our Daily Bread gives food with a personal touch and with dignity." Elder Jones says. The couple is now an integral part of the group of volunteers who serve every Tuesday.

"It is the highlight of our week. We left a family at home, but found family here."

For Sister Jones, the opportunity has allowed them to establish friendship with peers their own age.

"We have felt welcomed and the hand of friendship was immediately extended," she says. "Catholic Charities does great work and the response has been very positive both ways."

Elder Jones' ability to speak fluent Spanish, a language he learned in two months of training before a mission to Bolivia as a young adult 50 years ago, has helped Our Daily Bread be more welcoming to clients who speak little or no English.

He has created information sheets in Spanish that explain the pantry's documentation requirements to help the check in process run smoother.

He also is available to speak one-one-one with any client during his Tuesday shift.

"We have realized how much alike each of us is." Sister Jones says. "Those of us in service could be just one unfortunate circumstance away from needing help."

They agree that their first year in Wichita has been a wonderful experience, and they look forward to continuing as volunteers at Our Daily Bread until their mission ends in the fall of 2023.

"We are all God's children," Elder Jones says.

"All those we serve help us come closer to Christ and experience His love," Sister Jones adds. "We are able to practice true discipleship. We need them as much as they need us."
